## HEAD LICE IN THE CLASSROOM

Date: April 28, 2021

Dear Parent/Guardian:

Clovis Unified operates on "NO LIVE LICE" guidelines. The parents of children with active head lice will be notified when we find them. It has been suggested by the <u>American Academy of Pediatrics</u> that parents check their children's head periodically to prevent further cases.

<u>Please check your child's head</u> for nits (eggs) on the hair shaft. They can be identified by looking for white or brown tear-drop shaped eggs close to the scalp that cannot be removed easily. If you find the eggs or lice, contact your physician or pharmacist for a medication to kill the head lice.

All bed linen must be laundered, along with frequently worn clothing. It is also a good idea to treat all affected family members at the same time. Head Lice is not necessarily a matter of cleanliness. Please notify your child's school **HEALTH OFFICE** if you find signs of head lice on your child.

This problem can be completely treated in a couple of hours. The school nurse or trained staff will clear your child for re-admission to school after determining that the treatment has been effective in getting rid of the lice and nits.

Additional information regarding treatment is on the backside of this notice

The occurrence of head lice is a common problem in childhood. We mention this not to alarm you, but rather to alert you in hopes that you will be especially observant for this condition in your child.

## WHAT TO LOOK FOR:

- 1. Frequent itching of the scalp, especially at the base of the neck and around the ears.
- 2. Small white to yellow eggs approximately one-half the diameter of the head of a pin. They are firmly attached to the hair and will not flake off like dandruff. These are called nits.
- 3. A very small bug approximately 1/8 inch (or smaller) that is gray-brown. This is a louse and is often difficult to see.

## WHAT TO DO:

- 1. Contact your family doctor or pharmacist about medication that will kill the lice. They will often not kill the nits. It is highly advisable to treat <u>all</u> affected family members at the same time.
- 2. Remove all of the nits. The Public Health Department recommends that you use a <u>METAL</u>

  <u>TOOTHED</u> <u>COMB THAT IS USUALLY SOLD SEPARATELY FROM THE</u>

  <u>MEDICATION</u> for this process. This can be completed in 1-2 hours and the child can return to school when all nits and lice have been removed.
- 3. Please continue to comb your child's hair daily with a METAL COMB for two weeks.
- 4. Re-treat the hair on the eleventh day in order to kill any newly hatched nits that may have been missed during removal.
- 5. Wash all bed linen and dry all frequently worn clothing or items that have had contact with your child's hair. Items that cannot be washed should be stored in a sealed plastic bag for two weeks.
- 6. Use good house cleaning techniques such as sweeping or vacuuming rugs and furniture; concentrating in the child's bedroom. <u>Fumigating or spraying the house is not necessary.</u>
- 7. <u>All children must be cleared by the school nurse or trained staff before they will be readmitted to class on the day they return.</u>

Please continue to check and monitor your children for head lice <u>for the next two weeks.</u> In the meantime, be watchful and remind your children not to use other peoples' combs, hairbrushes, scarves, and/or hats. Please feel free to contact the school's Health Office if you have any further questions.
